
Efforts:

- Influence policy change
- For decades, educate our elected officials especially at our annual Midwife Lobby Day
- Communicate the concerns and needs of midwives & families to the Department of Health, the Health Care Authority, the Midwifery Advisory Committee and third party payors

2022 Policy Accomplishments

PASSED our Bill for two License Extension options to enable LMs who wish to complete additional training, the ability to:

- Obtain & administer hormonal and non-hormonal contraception & meds for common perinatal conditions such as antibiotics for infections like mastitis
- Insert contraception after supervised demonstration of skills (ie, IUDs & Implants)



Original Goal with Bill

- New Zealand as a Model "medications and therapies for common conditions during pregnancy and postpartum"
 - But compromise with the WA State Medical Association for their support of the bill required outlining drug categories
 - Were able to maintain ability to update rules prn
- Some items not on statute "list" due to rushed nature of this change



Reduce costs and barriers to care by

Eliminating unnecessary additional visits with another provider

Clients might not attend an additional visit with another provider due to cost or insurance obstacles, time, inconvenience, transportation barriers, or new provider trust issues

Some Statute Details

"A midwife licensed under this chapter who has been granted a limited prescriptive license extension by the secretary may prescribe, obtain, and administer:

- (a) Antibiotic, antiemetic, antiviral, antifungal, low-potency topical steroid, and antipruritic medications and therapies, and other medications and therapies as defined in the midwifery legend drugs and devices rule for the prevention and treatment of conditions that do not constitute a significant deviation from normal in pregnancy or postpartum; and
- (b) Hormonal and nonhormonal family planning methods.

A midwife licensed under this chapter who has been granted an additional license extension to include medical devices and implants by the secretary may prescribe, obtain, and administer hormonal and nonhormonal family planning medical devices, as prescribed in rule." For complete Bill language as passed:

Currently hoping to add during Rule-Making:



- Additional Drug Categories: galactagogues, topical analgesia for anal/vulvar/perineal pain, and
- Preterm labor preventatives, stool softeners, vitamins and minerals for prevention and to treat deficiencies, over-the-counter medications as needed and medications for SAB prevention and completion and smoking cessation and prescription referrals for IV Iron infusions.
- And probably a few more...

More behind the Story:

- Supported by ARNPs United and WA State Medical Association after meetings & minor revisions
- Bill lost most of its bi-partisan support when the Republican caucus sought to add language restricting any potential future scope expansion regarding abortion services which LMs cannot currently provide



- Unsuccessful attempts were made to add amendments in both the House and Senate to remove gender inclusive language updates to the statute
 - The proposed language change to "individuals" was preserved since it would be dangerous legal precedent to indicate that women aren't individuals

More 2022 Policy Accomplishments

- Maintained cap on the LM licensing fee included in the House, Senate & Governor's budgets as \$150K line item
- Updated <u>Drug Legend for LM use of U/S & TXA</u>

Supported also the Passage of the following Bills:

- SB 5702: Insurance coverage of human breast milk from a milk bank while babies are hospitalized
- HB 1651: Allowing providers to bill separately for immediate postpartum contraception
- SB 1881: Access to reimbursement for Doulas
- HB 1947/SB 5838: Providing a monthly diaper subsidy for families receiving TANF





Improve timely quality access to needed care



Looking Ahead: 2023

- Pay equity for Midwives
 - Fair reimbursement for commonly underpaid billing codes (BAs, labor management, birth supplies)
 - Collaboration with HCA on maternity bundle and other fair-pay efforts
- Budget Proviso needed to secure the Cap on LM licensing fees for this biennium

Looking Ahead: The Birth Center Regulations



Both MAWS and WARM have submitted petitions to review the Washington state birth center regulations. There are multiple areas that could use updating and modernization.

We do have to be careful as we pursue these changes because once opened anyone with an interest in what we do can propose changes.

Meetings are in progress.

Looking Ahead: The Birth Center Regulations



The main areas that will be reviewed are:

- updating gendered language
- working to separate out responsibilities that belong to the midwife rather than the birth center (ie giving RhIG at a follow up visit, filing a birth certificate or collecting a newborn screen)
- streamlining the inspection process to allow CABC inspection to be used in lieu of DOH inspections (but NOT requiring them)
- removing rapid HIV testing language (which no one is currently doing)
- removing language around paper charting
- removing the restriction around prior uterine surgery
- adjusting room size requirements to be more in line with other outpatient facilities
- Indicating a birth center is "B occupancy," (a maxi-house), and is not like an ambulatory surgery center (a mini-hospital) in terms of the building requirements
- removing requirement to have a neonatal glucometer at the birth center (as expensive equipment can be a barrier for starting a birth center)




Looking Ahead
